ON THE MIDNIGHT WATCH by Tom Morris 66-69



During the 1967 USS Yancey Med Cruise we loaded a company of Marines that were stationed on board for the duration of the cruise. We forgot that they were there most of the time and had little interaction with them with them having their own set of duties and responsibilities. Captain James McCarter was the CCO for the Marine company and had little interaction with the sailors, he was a hard-core officer with a reputation of being a hard ass. I was on a midnight watch & approached by Capt. McCarter about 2:00 AM and he started talking to me and we engaged in a casual two-sided conversation of a personal nature, where we were each from, why we selected the branch of the service we chose. I was quite impressed, & intimidated

that a captain in the Marines and company commander, with his reputation would strike up a conversation with an enlisted seaman. The conversation lasted approximately 15 minutes and one I never will forget because within months he would be in Vietnam and one of the many casualties. I often wondered if he had the transfer to Nam on his mind that night, however he never mentioned Nam. Fifty years passed when my wife Eileen and I were planning to take our grandchildren to Washington DC. I went on the internet and searched for Capt. McCarter's location on the Vietnam Memorial and noticed there were no pictures of him on that website, while most others had them. I contacted the organization that handles the maintenance of the wall and copied his picture from the Yancey Med Trip 67 and sent it to them. Now when you search for him you will see the same picture from our 1967 Med cruise book in X Division. Next time you are at the war memorial Capt. McCarver can be found at Panel 28E Line 3, and burial at Arlington, section 6 Site 5744-A-1
